## FROM YOUR PASTOR



#### "Between the Dust"

I am sitting in our church parking lot an hour before the drive through imposition of ashes. It is thirty four degrees. I'm sitting here an hour early, because I announced the wrong time and led others to do the same. So, I'm waiting here in the parking lot an hour early, thinking of human frailty, thinking

of the cold, thinking of the ways in which we sometimes mess up without meaning to.

One of the great comforts in our tradition is that there is provision made for our frailty. Pushing against our shared puritanical history, the scriptures recognize clearly, that "from dust you were created and to dust you shall return".

Psalm 103 reads:

The life of mortals is like grass— They bloom like a flower of the field;

the wind passes over, it vanishes,

its place remembers it no more.

This is not to excuse bad behavior, but it is to understand it in ourselves and others. It is to recognize that, in our journey toward Easter living, there are potholes, broken roads, and sometimes scary ledges we must navigate on our way. On our journey toward Easter living, there are no Superwomen and no Supermen. Human frailty is found in all of us.


## FROM YOUR PASTOR

But God has made a deep and profound provision for us. That provision is called Grace. Grace is the pure and freely given gift that is secured by, and abundantly shared with us in Jesus Christ. In Christ, the Spirit indwells us, not so we can float over the water filled potholes, but so we can find God's gracious love, even as our feet are soaked by dingy water.

This Lent instead of "giving something up" we are suggesting that we "add something good" as we journey on. We are suggesting that we focus on God's grace and the Spirit's work in us to help us add practices that will lead to gracious living. This Lent we would like to add a deeper element of living "between the dust"; between our birth and death. What we do matters. So how can we add some simple practices that will help us live more gracious lives?

Two ways to show and practice this is to bring donations to worship for the Caring Ministry, remembering our "Reverse Lenten Calendar" presented in last month's newsletter; and/or place a leaf on the trees in the sanctuary and chapel, symbolizing some gracious practice you will add during this season.

This Lent, let us acknowledge our human frailty while modelling the grace extended to us by the gifts we extend to others.

#### How to transition to EFT (Electronic Fund Transfer)

Electronic Fund transfer is a way of giving on a schedule via your bank to FPC's bank. Signing up is simple. Provide the following information to Cindy Fields; account number, routing number, amount of contribution, date of withdraw (the 1st, the 16th, or both).

You may provide this information by;

- Sending in a voided check write on your check the date of withdrawal and the amount.
- Email only if you are comfortable with this. Please triple check your account numbers for accuracy.
- Calling in Our voicemail is secure so you can leave all information if no one answers.

Your contributions will continue until you confirm a stop date. You may make contributions to anything through EFT including Caring Ministry.



### Online Giving

Online Giving gives you the freedom to control your giving on your schedule and type of payment. Here are instructions:

- 1) Go to www.fpcyork.org and find the GIVE NOW button at the top right of the screen. Clicking on this will take you directly to the FPC giving platform.
- 2) From here you will select the category to which you would like to give and enter the amount.
- Scroll down and select the donation frequency (one time, weekly, monthly, etc.)

- 5) Enter your personal information, name, address, account info. It is suggested to create a password so you can access or edit your giving information at a later date.

#### **One Great Hour of Sharing**

#### **Easter Special Offering**

"Food Insecurity" is a growing problem in York. We see this clearly in the sharp rise in the number of neighbors seeking help to feed their families at our Caring Ministry "Ruth Kammer" Food Pantry,

However, what we consider to be a mounting problem in our community pales in comparison with what food insecurity looks like in Africa. Ben and Emily Okello can tell you how hard it is when they can only serve one meal of maize a day to the



85 orphans they have rescued and brought to the Scofield School and Orphanage in Kenya. The food shortage has become so severe in that part of Africa that the Okellos also have had to hire security guards to keep what little grain they have from being stolen.

Because their need is so acute at this time, the Mission Committee has chosen to give the entire amount of the Easter Special Offering to the Okello ministry, in order that they can buy and protect what food is available to them.

Food prices are high in our grocery stores as well, but as you grumble over the cost of everything edible, thank God for what you can afford and ask Him what you can give to help feed others who cannot buy food at any price and for whom "food insecurity" remains an ongoing fact of life.

#### **Mission Update**

#### The Faders, Part Two

Last month In Mission Update, we introduced the Fader family: Dr. Tim and Patti Fader and their four children, Alyssa, Jason, Eli, and Caleb, a family we have supported with our mission dollars for many years. We left them in 1987, as they were moving to Africa to serve as medical missionaries. We are picking their story up there.

Tim and Patti had sensed God calling them to serve the medically needy in Africa after they had covered for another medical missionary family on furlough from Kijabe Hospital in Kenya. During that four-month period, they had fallen in love with the Kenyan people and had experienced their extreme poverty and the limited medical care available to them.

As doors began opening to them.

and obstacles to their moving abroad were removed with little or no effort on their part, they felt certain that God was making the way for them to relocate to Kijabe on a permanent basis. The whole family looked forward to this move.

The result of trusting God and following His lead in this matter can be seen in their 16-year medical ministry in Kijabe that followed. Tim's work included treating Kenyan patients and teaching Western Medicine practices to African doctors, helping to establish a medical residency program at Kijabe Hospital to train the next generation of "home grown" doctors. Patti worked with the women and children, using her nursing skills and love for the African people to provide obstetrical care and improve the medical care of children.



Meanwhile the Fader's own children thrived. All four children attended and graduated from Rift Valley Academy, a K-12 Christian boarding school established for the children of missionaries. All four came to the States for college and each graduated with degrees and skills that would be useful on the mission field.

They never felt deprived of anything important. In fact, Eli put it this way: "Kijabe is a child's paradise. Lots of places to explore, ride bikes, play sports, etc. I remember that the Fader boys had a reputation for leaving the house clean and by the time we made it to the school (1/2 mile away) we were covered in dirt and tree sap, and had some kind of creature in our school bag to show our friends."

Patti affirms that the children were very comfortable in Africa and that it was "home" to them. The most difficult time for them was when they returned to the States for furlough every 4 years. Everything was strange to them here. The wealth and waste was hard for them to understand and made them sad. The contrast between the abundance here in our country and the poverty of the people they knew and loved "back home" was undoubtedly part of what informed their career decisions later in life.

FPC played a role in sending the Fader's off by commissioning them for medical mission service before they left the States. Once again doctors from the church travelled to minister with them on personal mission trips. Drs. Pete Piper, Bob MacDougall and Bill Rexrode all served for various periods of time in Kijabe. Pete and Annie Piper stayed for a full year once Dr. Piper had retired.

At that time FPC also began giving Tim and Patti financial support through a yearly line item in our mission budget. Our gifts, along with those of 5 other churches and 25 individuals, made it possible for Patti to say, "We praise God that we were totally financially supported throughout our years of missionary service. God raised up a financial support team and a Prayer Team that kept us before the Throne of Grace during the whole time we served."

MISSIONS

Once all the children had graduated from High School, Tim and Patti considered moving to a very rural bush clinic in Kenya that needed a doctor, instead of staying at Kijabe Hospital which was, by then, fairly well staffed. However, while they were on a furlough that occurred shortly after the Taliban was defeated in Afghanistan, they learned of an opportunity to go to Afghanistan. Invited by the government to teach Afghan

doctors, this was a wonderful, God-given, opening into that very closed country. After much prayer, Tim and Patti decided this unique call was for them.

During their time in Afghanistan, Tim and other Western doctors were able to treat Afghan patients with "Western" methods of care and, as in Kenya, worked to establish a family medical residency training program to teach these methods to Afghani doctors. Tim led these efforts as Director of the Family Medicine Residency.

Meanwhile, Patti, was obliged to wear a burka, which, in this strict Muslim culture was required of all women when they outside of their homes. This practice of completely covering body and head was found to be the cause of bone fragility and pain that was common among the Afghani women who were Vitamin D deficient from lack of sunlight on their skin. The introduction of Vitamin D supplements was one very welcome gift from the West..

Other adjustments had to be made by the Christians serving in a 99.9% Muslim nation. They were permitted to deliver medical care, but sharing their faith was strictly forbidden. As guests of the Afghan government, the Western doctors were extremely careful not to offend their hosts.



However, it was not lost on the Afghan people who came under their medical care and the Afghani doctors they were training that these Western doctors were different. They were patient and compassionate with people of all stations and were especially respectful of women. Jesus had to be revealed in their actions, not proclaimed; and God gave them quiet opportunities to display the Word of God without having to preach it.

After they had served the people of Afghanistan for 8 years, Tim began to sense that his work there was winding down. When he received correspondence from a Western family medical doctor who wanted very much to work with the Afghanis, he felt comfortable turning over his position to a well-trained replacement and prayerfully waiting for the Lord to reveal what He had in mind for them.

Another Western doctor soon brought the answer to that question when he let Tim know that he had an opportunity to work in Somaliland, another insulated Muslim nation. After praying about this, Tim and Patti decided to make another move so Tim and this doctor could establish another medicine residency training program, this time in Somaliland. God, went before them, as He always did, orchestrating the move.

After ministering for four years in Somaliland, it was officially time for Tim to retire. However, there was also a need in Nkhoma Hospital, Malawi, for an Interim Medical Director who could help with establishing a family medicine residency. Tim had all the skills and still possessed the passion that was needed for these projects. There was also a need for assistance in Medical Records at the Hospital, a position Patti could fill. Once again, after seeking God's will in prayer, they came out of retirement before actually getting settled in and said yes to a 1½- year commitment in Malawi. When they finally retired, they had served as medical missionaries in Africa for 29 ½ years!

Tim and Patti are no longer serving in mission, but the FPC Mission Budget still has a line item labeled "Faders". This is no longer support for Tim and Patti. The Fader funds now go to their three sons, Jason, Eli, and Caleb, who are continuing to labor for the Lord in remote areas of Africa. Next month in "Hallelujah" we will share what is happening with the second generation of Faders (and the THIRD!). Stay tuned for the final installment of "The Fader Family Story."

## CARING MINISTRY



As we progress through 2024, I am striving to continue to build, maintain, and strengthen the relationships within our Caring Ministry staff and volunteers, between the Church and the Caring Ministry, and between the Caring Ministry and the community. Each of these relationships develop and support the work of the Caring Ministry and how we serve our neighbors on a daily basis.

At the end of January, my husband and I hosted a gathering of the Caring Ministry staff and volunteers. Thirty-three people from the Caring Ministry staff and volunteers - including some of their significant others and young children - ate, played a fun game, and learned more about each other. I am continually amazed at the dedication and commitment from our staff and volunteers to support our neighbors in need. I witness the volunteers channeling their strengths and skill sets to best meet the needs of the work we do. Some volunteers choose to restock the shelves and organize the inventory. Other individuals prefer to interact with our neighbors - building relationships, listening and praying with them, and ultimately fulfilling their physical needs with the food shopping experience.

I would be remiss if I did not also acknowledge the many FPC members who contribute to the Caring Ministry with financial and inkind contributions. In January, FPC donated 774.7 pounds of food to the Caring Ministry. With the help of the FPC Youth, we also received 297.5 pounds during the Souper Bowl of Caring. We were blown away by the many generous contributions of food and toiletries as well as the monetary donations totaling almost \$900!! We are grateful to continue this partnership with the FPC Youth to assist feeding our neighbors in need. CARING MINISTRY

Each monetary donation is greatly appreciated as those gifts support the monthly and weekly food bank purchases as well as our trips to the local grocery stores to supplement our staples such as eggs, potatoes, onions, bread, and other items - as needed. Did you know that we order between 2,000 - 3,000 pounds each month from the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank (CPFB) and around 400 pounds each week from the York County Food Bank (YCFB)? The cost of these food and toiletry staples are steadily rising - just as we see in our own grocery store bills! Please know the average cost of a CPFB food truck delivery - with the 2,000 to 3,000 pounds of food - ranges between \$750 - \$1,000 per month. We are so grateful for the individuals and families who have helped with these expenses each month. We need that continued support now, more than ever, and we are truly blessed with the understanding of our donors and their willingness to share their sponsorship with other supporters!

We also grew our relationships in the Community as we started a partnership with Perrydell Farm and Dairy. We are pleased to announce that Perrydell Farm and Dairy is now delivering milk to the Caring Ministry each week at a reduced or wholesale cost. With their help we save on the weekly milk prices, and we are thrilled to be able to support a local farm while also providing our neighbors with fresh milk! We encourage you to thank Perrydell Farm and Dairy next time you stop in for some milk, ice cream, or other local products. I would also like to thank and acknowledge the Weis Markets on Roosevelt Avenue, who provides us with a \$25 gift card on a regular basis to help with the purchase of white sliced bread - a staple for families who want to make sandwiches! As we build upon our relationships with more businesses and organizations in our community, we are able to share what we do in our ministry at FPC to help our neighbors in need!!



Over the next few months, we hope to continue to expand upon our partnerships between the Caring Ministry and the Community. I truly believe that there is strength in numbers, and I'm glad we can all work together to make a difference! Currently, there are five ladies in our church who get together every few months to pack Period Supply bags for our Caring Ministry shelves as well as community organizations such as the YWCA and Code Blue. Each Period Supply bag contains maxi pads, regular pads, liners, and tampons for one month. 




